### CHALLENGES & SOLUTIONS

Indian Creek Elementary is a Title I school in Clarkston, GA, a refugee resettlement base. It is one of the largest elementary schools in DeKalb County. One hundred percent of students receive free breakfast and lunch, and 78 percent of students are English language learners (ELLs).

“Our students come from more than 40 countries. They bring with them 45 different languages and dialects, along with their rich cultures,” said Stephanie Brown-Bryant, principal of Indian Creek Elementary.

“Literacy is one of our greatest challenges. I became aware of Learning A-Z at the Georgia Educational Technology Conference.

A 10-minute stop at the booth became a two-and-a-half-hour conversation because I was interested in all of the features and how they could be used with our students since we have such a high ESOL population. “When I was teaching fourth grade, my coworker used Headsprout with students who were new to the country and just beginning to learn the English language, and it really helped them, too,” said fifth grade teacher Shermain Jessie.

“Whether students are below, at, or above grade level, they can work at the level that’s right for them,” said Calkins. “Headsprout is engaging and my students love it.”

## Blending science and literacy with Science A-Z

“Writing A-Z is user friendly and my students love it. It’s neat for them to be able to see their writing on screen and add pictures to it,” said Calkins.

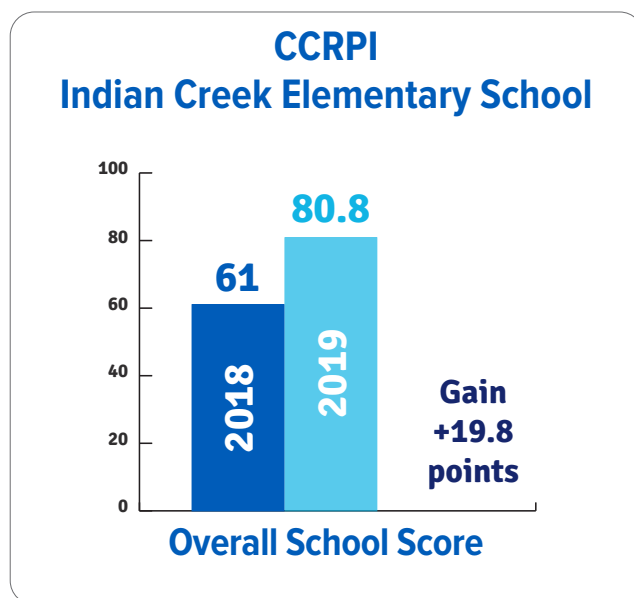

“That’s such a motivator for my students because they want to get to that point where they can make a book and publish it,” said Calkins.

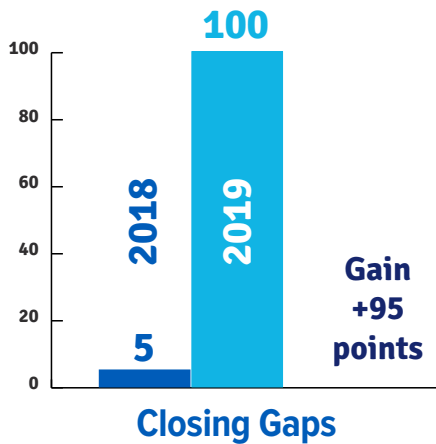
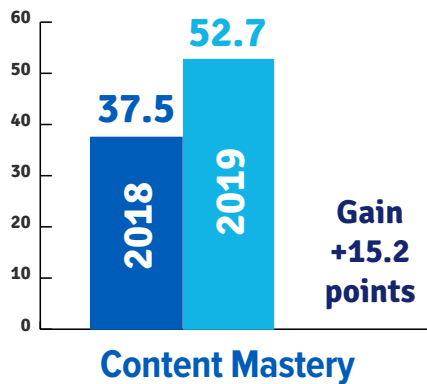
## RESULTS

From 2018 to 2019, the Overall School Score increased by almost 20 points. Learning A-Z was part of the educational experience. Students showed a gain of more than 15 points in Content Mastery, which includes achievement scores in English language arts (ELA), mathematics, science, and social studies.

“In ELA, the gain was 17.29 points, moving it closer to district and state averages,” said Nykamp.

“This is notable considering Indian Creek’s sizeable ELL population.”

In addition, Indian Creek Elementary is improving performance and closing academic achievement gaps among all student subgroups, including economically disadvantaged students and ELLs.

“I have the most fantastic teachers in the world, and my ESOL teachers are phenomenal. We have several initiatives to make sure we’re meeting the needs of our students. We are very intentional with our training. We provided schoolwide training for the Learning A-Z products, which has assisted us in our growth. With the Learning A-Z resources, we can provide consistency across our building while meeting every individual student where they are,” said Brown-Bryant.

Another factor that has contributed to the students’ growth is the school’s commitment to data-driven instruction. “Before, we had some teachers who thought they were doing well in specific areas, but when we looked at the data, we didn’t see growth. When they increased their use of the Learning A-Z products, we saw an increase in the progress of those classes because of the quality of the products. It provides so many options for teachers that it takes away excuses for not providing great instruction,” said Brown-Bryant.

In addition, in 2018-19, teachers in grades 3-5 began using NWEA MAP data to project how students would perform on state assessments.

“This helped teachers hone in on individual students and groups to determine how to better meet their needs. We left it up to teachers to decide how to best address those needs, and time after time, they chose to utilize the Learning A-Z products. Overall, they have had a great impact on how we’ve gotten kids to move forward in our school,” said Nykamp.
